The news that Private Jack Crossman, or as he was usually called, "Cousin Jack," had been killed in Libya has been received in Te Kuiti. Private Crossman was born in Cornwall 32 years ago. For the past seven years he had been an employee of the Agricultural Lime Company, where he was working up to the time of his enlistment for overseas service with the Second Echelon. He was prominent in sport, being a keen member of the Kiwi Cricket Club and the Waitete Football Club. He was also a member of the Foresters' Lodge.

Private Richard Hugh Wallis had resided with his aunt, Mrs P. Helwig, of Kihikihi, from eight years of age to the time of his enlistment. He was educated at the Kihikihi School and subsequently followed a farming occupation. He left New Zealand with the Third Echelon.

#### JOHN AND ROBERT BEVIN

Private advice was received in Te Awamutu this morning concerning the two sons, now serving overseas, of Mr and Mrs F. W. Bevin, of Picton, and formerly of Te Awamutu. Second-Lieutenant John Bevin has been posted missing, but is believed to be a prisoner of war. Second-Lieutenant Robert Bevin, who was lately wounded in the left shoulder, is in hospital, where he is progressing favourably.
